Style Information for Articles

High standard of academic research can be achieved by good feedback and constructive discourse between academic researchers. For this purpose departments are encouraged to publish discussion papers. The aim of Yaşar University, Department of Economics Discussion papers is to make research results readily available to other academic researchers so as to encourage discussions, suggestions for the revisions of the papers, and to enable the timely application of the analyses and results that they contain.

General appearance:

Cover page: The cover page should include the University's title and the logo and the relevant department's name (e.g. Discussion Papers in Economics). The paper should be given a serial number (e.g. the sixth paper published in 2015 would be numbered 2015/6). The paper's title and the name of the author(s) should also be clearly indicated. The back cover should accurately state the address of the issuing department.

Recent discussion papers: The last page of the paper should provide a list of all the discussion papers published by the department during that particular year. In each case the issue number, the title and the author(s) of the each paper should be clearly stated.

Before discussion paper publication: Discussion papers will reflect the ongoing research profile of each department. It is therefore strongly recommended that, before submitting a paper for publication, appropriate feedback from departmental colleagues have been sought. (e.g. a departmental seminar or opinion of another departmental colleague who works in the similar area).

Manuscripts submitted to Economics Department for publication as a discussion paper should comply with the following guidelines.

Manuscripts submitted for consideration: Manuscripts should be submitted in two formats: both as a PDF copy and as a word file. The copy, 1.5 spaced and cleanly printed, with 3 cm margins on all sides. The electronic copy, which will form the basis for printing, should include all the relevant diagrams, tables and artwork.

Manuscript Specifics.

Title Page: Include the title of the article, author(s) name(s), and affiliation(s). Acknowledgements should also be included on this page and should constitute the first footnote of the article. Authors are expected to reveal the source of any financial or research support received in connection with the preparation of their article. The title page should also contain at least one classification code according to the Classification System for Journal Articles as used by the [Journal of Economic Literature](#); in addition, up to five key words should be supplied. The author(s) may include their e-mail address, for future correspondence purposes, in the footnote of this page.

Abstract: An abstract of no more than 100 words should be included on a page following the title page.

Tables and Figures: Number figures and tables consecutively (Table 1, Table 2, etc.). Do number them according to the section in which they appear.

Formulae. Displayed formulae should be numbered consecutively throughout the manuscript as (1), (2), etc. against the right-hand margin of the page.

(The following guidelines are not compulsory but strongly recommended).

Reference Citations: Include the first name of each author when first mentioned, either in text or in footnotes. Each subsequent reference to an author should include only the last name, unless two or more authors have the same last name. Citations should take the place of footnotes whenever possible. Work them into the text smoothly.

Footnotes: Number footnotes in order, corresponding to numbers in the text, and place them at the bottom of the page (rather than as endnotes).

Reference List: Verify references carefully; they must correspond to the citations in text. List them alphabetically, by author's last name, and then by year. In references lists only the first author's name is inverted. Please list all authors; avoid using et al. in lieu of authors' names. Include authors' first names unless the first names are not published. See the following examples.
